Porta Potties are located northeast of the Food Court.


The campus of St. John's Lutheran Ministries is smoke-free.

Pets are welcome at St. John's, but please respect others. Please pick up after your pets, and if they are barking or making noise, take them elsewhere.



hen you take Celtic, Spanish, and Italian Music, and mix it up, you get the true nature of the Black Irish. For twentyfive years this band has created an original sound that no other band has. With over 500 concert performances to date and airplay around the world, the band has kept very busy spreading their brand of progressive folk music to a large audience. Performing both traditional and original music the band is very focused on presenting acoustic music in a very exciting up-beat way that appeals

to all ages. The band has written and recorded over 96 original songs that appear on any of the bands twenty-fve CD recordings. Many of the original works written by the band are based on Celtic history.

Patrick Michael Karnahan and Richard Restivo met on the set of "Back to the Future III" in 1989. This is when the idea of the Black Irish Band began to first bloom. Both Patrick and Rick were in the "Hill Valley Brass Band," while future band mate Steve McArthur was given a speaking role as festival man #1. During filming breaks, Patrick and Rick began to formulate the idea for a traditional folk group that would cross cultural and musical boundaries...an acoustic folk band with no limits! At the first band meeting the name Black Irish was chosen. The strong vocals and up-tempo instrumentals breathe new life to old songs and present original material with a distinctive flair. The original songs of Patrick Michael Karnahan have received considerable airplay on various folk-rock and public radio stations.

After graduating in 1996 from Montana State University-Billings with a BA in Music Performance, John moved to Los Angeles to earn his Master of Fine Arts in Western Orchestral Trombone Performance from California Institute of the Arts.

After 16 years in Los Angeles, John is currently on staff in Montana at MSU Billings as a Jazz, music theory, low brass and World Music instructor. He also maintains a private studio, ranging from beginning to college level musicians, teaching brass skills, classical repertoire, production, jazz and commercial theory and improvisation. Along with his private studio, he regularly works and performs as a clinician and guest artist in schools, continuing to hone his skills as an educator by sharing the "real world" of music with his students.

John is active in the Montana and Los Angeles performing and studio scenes as an arranger, bandleader, session player and composer. Most recent works are the new Dr. Dre production, "Straight Outta Compton," and Ricardo Lemvo's new Cuban-West African album.

When not dabbling in the world of music, John is likely found coaching soccer or wandering through the hills and rivers with his wife and children.

n 1997, a small group of physicians began gathering regularly to play music and relax away from the pressures of their vocation. Bob Snider, Mac McClave, and Doug Ezell would play and sing old folk tunes and rock standards. After a while, though, they added two more doctors: Hal Forseth and Jim Epler. Paula McClave joined. Then for Christmas, 1999, their wives booked them a gig! It was the following April at the Club Carlin. They practiced! A lot!! They came up with a name. The MidLife Chryslers were born!

Epler retired from the band then Mark Moak joined as drummer. Just as they were getting going, the death of Bob Snider in March 2001 dealt them a major setback. However, the music and the spirit of Bob called them back and the Chryslers re-formed. With the additions of Russ Harvey and Cathy Hansen Brown.

In 2006, Mac and Paula left the band; Scott Millikan came on to share lead guitar with Russ. Then Cathy departed and Holly Malloy Hanson joined the Chryslers as lead female vocalist. In 2008, four horn players joined the band. Aaron Morgenstern on saxophone, Steve Patton on trombone, and brothers Doug and Kevin McBride on trumpet.

With the departure of the golden voice of Dr./Colonel Russ Harvey, they searched far and wide for a singer. The Chryslers are excited to announce as of Spring 2016 the addition of Chris Smith, music director at Faith Chapel, as male lead vocalist. And since he lowers the average age of the band members, we can still call ourselves "midlife!!"





Born and raised in Montana where the cowboy spirit is still alive, the three brothers, John, Joe, and Marty realized a desire to bring back the good old western music from the days of Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, and the silver screen cowboys. For eight years they've been working on their harmony trying to simulate the sound and appearance of the Western Music groups of that time. They played for the first time for a public audience in 2013, and have since been playing regularly at the Pollard Hotel

in Red Lodge. With two guitars, an upright bass, and three part western harmony, their traditional sound has been compared to The Sons of the Pioneers and Marty Robbins. They are now currently members of the Western Music association.

Endowment, Gift

LOVE RECEIVED AND LOVE GIVEN FULL CIRCLE

The St. John's Foundation recently received an estate gift of \$100,000 from the Phillip L. and Margaret E. Dawes Trust. The expressed intent of this gift is that funds be used to establish an Endowment in their names, and that a portion of earnings be exclusively utilized each year for St. John's Lutheran Ministries employee scholarships. Sherry O'Conner, Trustee and niece, wrote: "The employees of St. John's played an important role in providing exceptional quality care for Phil and Marge during their senior years at St. John's. It was the wish of Phil and Marge that this endowment would serve as a 'thank you' for their professional service and friendship."

Prior to becoming residents at Mission Ridge in October, 1999, Phil and Marge lived for decades in Alaska, where they were married in 1947. Phil worked for the Bureau of Public Roads in the Juneau area until Alaska achieved Statehood in 1959. He then transferred to the newly created Alaska Department of Transportation until retirement in 1978. In Territorial days, Marge worked for the Social Security Administration. After Statehood she became the School Lunch Director within the Department of Education until retirement in 1977.

The continuum of care available to residents of Mission Ridge became a valued asset to Phil and Marge. When independent living was no longer possible for Phil, Marge testified that he received excellent care from loving staff at St. John's. Friends recall Marge visiting him every day until his death in 2006. That same year Marge transitioned from Mission Ridge to assisted living at The Vista, where she expressed gratefulness for excellent care received. Marge was famous for her cross stitch talent, which included the creation of elaborate Christmas cards until her death in November of 2015.

The love that Phil and Marge received from caring staff at St. John's has now come full circle, becoming love given. Many employees will benefit from student scholarship funds annually generated by this Endowed gift. Our thanks for the generous philanthropy of Phil and Marge Dawes.


